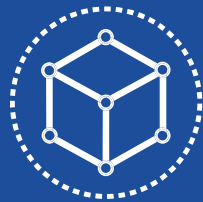

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Mapping where we started for – gaps and needs in the field

Funding & Resource Gap	Evaluation is often experienced as a 'burden', one more thing 'on top of' all we're doing, and does not receive dedicated funding, people and time to implement effectively
Skills & Knowledge Gap	Lack of broad knowledge in the field on how to do evaluation well
Competency Gap	Many of those doing evaluations lack core competencies and skills for how to do evaluations
Communication Gap	Results of evaluation are not well communicated
Utilization Gap	Poor planning for how to use results of evaluation, and often not utilizing results
Inclusion Gap	Failure to include communities and stakeholders
Methodology Gap	Methodologies often don't fit the need





Mapping where we started for – gaps and needs in the field

Sharing Gap	Lack of sharing results to improve the field
Participation Gap	Communities, Stakeholders, Practitioners often not authentically included
Ownership Gap	Those who are affected by the issues and practitioners involved, often have limited ownership
Impact Gap	Because of how evaluation is done / practiced today, it often doesn't have the impact needed to feed into direct improvements into policy and practice; because we're not 'learning' as well / as quickly as we can/should, we often have PVE/CVE/DeRad practice that is not as 'impactful' as it should be on the field
Policy Support Gap	Not enough engagement by policy makers to use learnings and findings of evaluation to inform and influence policy
Evidence Gap	<p>Not enough properly gathered evidence to better improve how we design and implement PVE/CVE/De-radicalisation initiatives</p> <p>Dismissive approach to 'what is evidence' – limited parameters and lack of understanding / valuing / acknowledging important 'other' areas of evidence</p>





Mapping where we started for – gaps and needs in the field

Gender Gap	
Recruitment	Recruitment is a challenge because there is no registration of victims. The organisation are reaching people who got public in media
Definitional Gap	Loose definitions and targets of the project, which is mostly driven by the participants' individual needs. Therefore, it is difficult to describe the outcomes.
Understanding of the evaluation	Perceiving short-term preventive actions as activities for which evaluation is not needed.
Data management	Lack of awareness that the documentation collected carefully and systematically during the implementation of the action would allow for an evaluation of the process.
Action Plan	Lack of awareness that action partners should be taken into consideration in advance as part of the Evaluation Team, with a clear division into roles and tasks to be performed within the Action Plan

Practitioners' main needs and gaps



Lack of theoretical knowledge on P/CVE and other crime prevention initiatives



Insufficient know-how on the conduction of evaluation (e.g., what it is and its benefits, indicators of success)



Need for the development of complementary skills and competences → critical thinking, problem solving, risk assessment, multi-agency cooperation

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What does Evidence-based Initiative Design mean?

- INDEED defines evidence-based initiative design (EBID) as a *"decision-making process which integrates the 1) best available evidence, 2) professional judgement and 3) stakeholder values, preferences and circumstances"*
- Evidence-based Initiative Design in P/CVE requires:
 - A **conscientious review of the evidence base**, including available knowledge about 1) risk and protective factors, and 2) results of already existing evaluations in the field.
 - **Experience and expertise** in P/CVE, including knowledge of the local/regional/national context for an initiative is designed.
 - The **careful consideration** of the circumstances, values and preferences **of key stakeholders**, including individuals and communities affected by the initiative design.

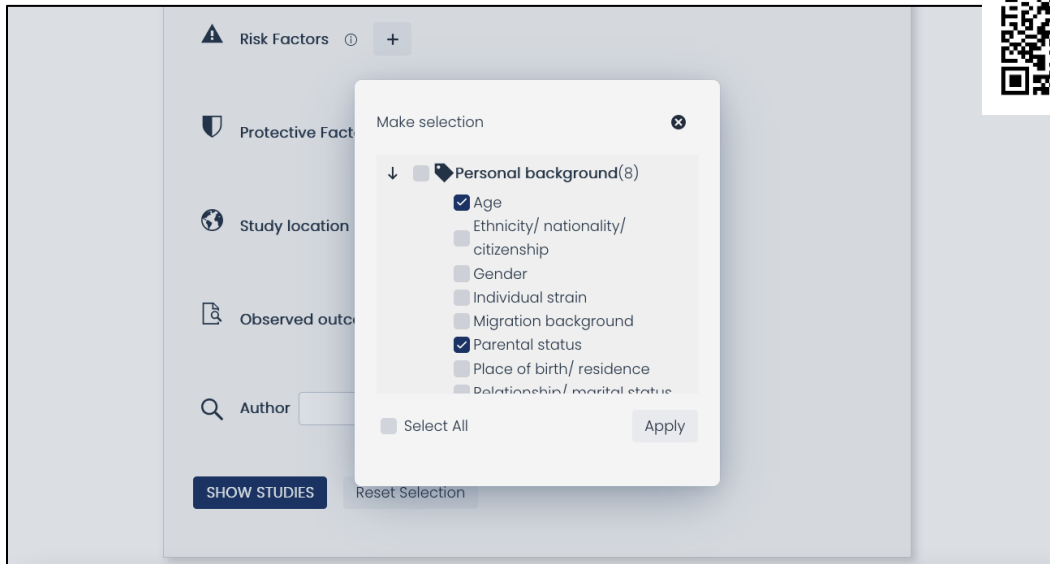

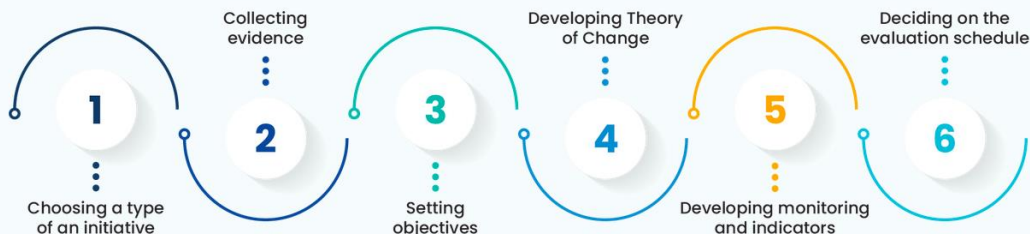

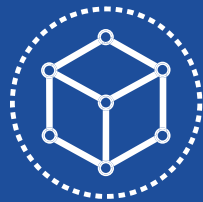
